Hammond also demonstrated how to use an electrostatic detection apparatus to decipher indentations and the relative ease of cutting and past-

New program leads way in computer handwriting analysis

A new computer program is giving more credibility to handwritten documents and their use in court, according to ABC News.

Computer Scientist Sargur Srihari and several colleagues at the University of Buffalo have developed software that can read two documents

and determine whether they were written by the same person, or two different people.

Srihari and his team gathered handwriting samples from over 1,500 people across the country and came up with 11 common features that characterize the structure of writing.

The program has a 96 per-

cent accuracy rate with a full page of handwriting and an 80 percent accuracy rate with a few handwritten words.

Srihari's program is garnering attention in the legal world. On April 29th, the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of Pennsylvania allowed expert testimony from Srihari to be used as evidence in a case.
